FROM THE LIBRARIAN, STEVE SYKES

Thinking of getting your first or perhaps a new recurve bow? Then Bow International Issue 189 is a place to look. Or perhaps you are considering some new archery gadgets to make life easier, or a new compound arrow rest? Then again, the latest issue of BI would be a good starting point.

In addition, you can find out much **about the 2025 World Cup including gear, stats and venue history**, although this will be in hindsight as the grand final was held in China last weekend.

From a more practical viewpoint, **some of the best footwear for target and field archery** is presented. Flat soles for target archery with minimal cushioning and a wide base to enhance stability are highlighted. With field archery taking you from flat into differing terrains, ankle support to reduce injury risk as well as weather protection are considered.

What's more important, arrows of the same weight or arrows all with the same front of centre balance (FOC)? If it is something you agonise over daily, the Dr. James Park's 'Ask the Experts' article may help you come to grips with this issue.

Another expert, psychologist Dr. Karl, answers questions and offers **helpful ways to manage stress** in his piece on Relaxation Techniques to master self-control, particularly those useful in sports.

PROPOSED REWORDING FOR AWARDING LIFE MEMBERSHIPS

Current wording as per club Regulations 21st May 2024: MEMBERSHIP GENERAL, 29.1

Life membership may be granted to any present or past member of the Club who has rendered outstanding service to the Club. A motion to bestow Life membership shall consist of a petition presented to an annual general meeting and signed by at least 20% of the adult membership of the Club, stating the outstanding services to the Club by the said member over a number of years which normally should not be less than ten. Life members shall be entitled to freely take part in any or all of the activities of the Club without further payment of annual subscriptions (the Club will pay (a) the club subscription, and where required also pay (b) the Archery SA fee and (c) the Archery Australia fee).

Discussion:

The 20% of members could be all recent members, who do not know the nominee, so the system could be "gamed"!

An alternative process could be to appoint a sub-committee to consider the nomination. That sub-committee can identify some peers to also review the citation. The sub-committee and the review can then present their findings to the Executive/General Meeting/AGM.

It is noted that the constitution of the club vests decisions in (all) the members, so a small committee limits that, but at the AGM, all those members can then vote.

It was noted we currently have 8 "active" life members.

It was agreed that this rewording would not be decided at this meeting, as it requires further consideration. Retaining the petition (requiring say 20% of members) has merit, as currently all decisions at the club are made by the members, and Life Membership is a "big deal" so having many members participate in the process is reasonable.

We could combine the petition with the selection committee, whereby the committee is still responsible for nominations, and then creates a petition(s) for circulation to the members.

It was also proposed that any nomination should be endorsed by at least one of the Executive Officers, to ensure the nominee fits the minimum criteria of a Life Membership.

Proposed rewording (changes are highlighted:

MEMBERSHIP GENERAL, 29.1

Life membership may be granted to any past or present member of the Club who has rendered outstanding service to the Club over a number of years, which normally should not be less than ten.

Life members shall assume all rights, privileges and responsibilities of financial members of the Club without further payment of annual subscriptions (the Club will pay (a) the club subscription, and where required also pay (b) the Archery SA fee and (c) the Archery Australia fee).

Three (3) months prior to the Annual General Meeting, the Executive will convene a committee consisting of no less than three adult members¹, to consider nominations 2 for Life Membership. Nominations will be the subject of a petition signed by at least 20% of members and then presented at the next Annual General Meeting for endorsement.

1 Who have at least 10 years of membership and ideally include some current Life Members.

2 A Nominee must be an adult member of the club, and the nomination shall state the rationale of why the nominee should be awarded a Life Membership.
